## **Harvard style**

citation in the text

- “text text (*author’s name, year of publication*)” or “text text *author’s name (publication year)* text text”
- in the case of two authors: (xy and yx, 2018)
- in the case of more than two authors: (xy et al., 2018)

reference list

- according to ABC order of the authors’s name
- exact template could be different, but you should follow uniform. Examples:
- journal paper

citation in the text

- “text text [1]”

reference list

- according to the order in the text
- exact template could be different, but you should follow uniform
- list the publications:
